REPORT

on a visit to the

WEST AFRICAN DISTRICTS.

----oCo----

In presenting a report on my visit to the West African Districts, I desire to acknowledge the goodness of God in whose care I journeyed and laboured in safety and in comfort from the day that I sailed to the day that I landed.

Sailing from Liverpool on the 28th of October 1914, I landed in Freetown, Sierra Leone on the 8th of November. In that District I spent five weeks in consultation with the missionaries, the Native Ministers, and the leading laymen of the Church, and in visiting Churches and inspecting work both in the Colony and Protectorate.

Landing in Lagos on the 17th of December, I spent between five and six weeks similarly meeting the brethren and travelling as far North as Oyo and Ilesha and West as far as Porto Novo in the French Colony of Dahomey.

On the Gold Coast I spent two whole months travelling over the greater part of that extensive District and in attending the Synod. On my return journey I landed again at Freetown where I spent a fortnight dealing with matters of special difficulty in connection with the finances of the new High School Building.

The infrequency and uncertainty of shipping prevented my giving the time to the Gambia that I had hoped to give. I was able however to spend the greater part of two days ashore and in that time met the Church and various committees in Bathurst, inspected the property, gave the prizes to the apprentices of the Industrial School and visited Cape St. Mary.

My enquiry in every place has extended to practically all questions of missionary policy, and efficiency of work, whether related to the Church or to the manifold forms of evangelistic effort.





The Convention met pursuant to adjournment. Agreeably to the order of the day the fifth section of the first article, with the amendment proposed yesterday by Mr. Hare and Mr. Shoemaker, being under consideration,

A motion was made by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Edwards, To postpone the consideration of the fifth as well as the sixth sections of the first article, in order to take into consideration the seventh section.

Mr. Hare withdrew his motion made yesterday. On the question—"Will the Convention agree to the postponement moved by Mr. Smith and Mr. Edwards?" It was determined in the affirmative.

The seventh section of the first article being then under consideration, viz. Section VII. The Senators shall be chosen in districts, to be formed by the Legislature, each containing, as nearly as may be, such a number of taxable inhabitants as shall be entitled to elect one Senator: Where that cannot be done, then such number of adjoining counties shall be formed into one district as shall be entitled to elect not more than four Senators; but neither the city of Philadelphia nor any county shall be divided in forming a district.

A motion was made by Mr. Lewis, seconded by Mr. Sigrevce, To amend the said section to read as follows: The Senators shall be chosen in districts, not fewer than three nor more than six in number, to be formed of adjoining counties by the Legislature, in such manner as that each shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of taxables: But neither the city of Philadelphia nor any county shall be divided in forming a district.

And on the question—"Will the Convention agree to the amendment?"—The Yeas and Nays being called by Mr. Smilie, were as follow, viz.






